London Devilettes Girls' Hockey Association

The London Devilettes Girls' Hockey Association (LDGHA) has proudly been the place for girls age five to 20-plus to play hockey in London for more than 25 years! The association was formed in the fall of 1986. During the first season, the Devilettes had a single team of approximately 20 PeeWee

age players. One of the largest girls' hockey associations in southwestern Ontario, the Devilettes currently has both house league and competitive teams with over 700 girls registered!



The driving force behind the formation of the Devilettes, Jim Martin, wanted a uniform for the girls that looked good and would be different. He liked the New Jersey Devils colours, red, green and white, and the feminine version of Devils became Devilettes. He designed the logo and thus the association officially became known as the London Devilettes Girls' Hockey Association. The

uniform has undergone several changes over the years, which have helped show the evolution and growth of girls' hockey in London. This year, the Devilettes introduced a new logo that modernized the look of the players' uniforms and is also quite distinctive. For the players, the logo is likely secondary

to getting on the ice to play, but they do have a sense of pride in wearing uniforms that represent both their club and their city. For the organization, the new logo breathes a freshness into an already well-established program.

Over the years, the house league and competitive teams have played in a number of

city-owned rinks across London. This year, the London Sports Park officially became the home of the Devilettes, with the new logo featured at centre ice, as well as a dedicated dressing room and a coaches room for the lunior team.
